Mission

To Provide Refugee and Underserved Women in the Community with Tools and Resources to Overcome Barriers To Success and Become Self-Sufficient.







How Does it Work?

Step 1

Purchase of Material

- Each participant is loaned solely the funds needed for the cost of her material or is provided the material itself to be repaid when her jewelry is sold or at a later fixed date.
- The cost of materials is wholesale thus optimizing profit margins.

Step 2

Inventory Creation

- Participants meet regularly to purchase supplies and for jewelry making instruction.
 They create a personal inventory of marketable, high quality jewelry.
- They also receive instruction in basic business skills, product presentation and marketing.

How Does it Work?

Step 3

Sales and Marketing

- BTP actively seeks low and no cost sales venues
- Home Parties
- Art and Craft Shows
- Community and Civic Events
- Micro-credit allows
 participants to purchase
 supplies from BTP inventory
 at a low cost and be
 rewarded with direct profit
 from jewelry sales.

Step 4

Self-Sufficiency

- Women phase out of the program when they gain a sufficient degree of skill and feel ready to start on their own.
- BTP continues to provide a support system to the graduated participants of the program. In return they are expected to recruit and mentor new participants.

Milestones

2012 – 2014: Tested the model with 10 refugee women.

2014 – 2017: Partnered with organizations that had a mission overlap and conducted training workshops to benefit over 270 disadvantaged female clients of:

- · Kentucky Refugee Ministries: 140 women
- · Catholic Charities: 40 women
- · Survivors or Torture Recovery Center: 20 women
- · Volunteers of America: 30 women
- · Doors to Hope: 20 women
- · Guiding Light Center: 10 women
- · West Louisville Women's Collaborative:10 women

Current Programs

Beaded Treasures: Jewelry Making Program

• Started in 2011 as a pilot initiative, this micro-lending program provides training in jewelry making skills, basic business skills and financial literacy to promote economic self-sufficiency.

Gourmet Treasures: Food Initiative

• A new program started in 2014, based on the success of the jewelry making model. The women capitalize on existing culinary skills and prepare and sell snacks and sweets from their native countries to the general public.

Threaded Treasures: Sewing Initiative

• Another BTP program started in 2014, based on the success of the jewelry making model. Participants create fabric-based craft for sale.

Global Treasures: Global Initiative

• Also started in 2014, this program expands the BTP model globally by providing entrepreneurial opportunities to women artisans all over the word.



How IDA saving for Business

Who funds it United Way



Immigrant women can receive micro-business loans of \$500- \$1,000 each to help them finance the start or strengthening of a micro-business. These loans termed at 6-12 months, with interest rate of 4.75% (or RIBA free).

- IICDC staff assist clients to create business plans, financial projections and marketing materials, such as business cards and fliers, to help ensure the success of these small ventures.
- Women meet regularly as a small group to discuss their goals, challenges and successes.
- We also maintain payment records and document each participant's progress, and submit payment records to credit bureaus.
- If a woman makes at least six loan payments on due date with no delay, she can join any festival and IICDC pay for the Booth.








Presentation to the Loan Review Committee (LRC)
